**Superintendent's Update: Students, Parents/Legal Guardians, and Staff**

I hope that you have been staying healthy and keeping warm as we journey through these colder temperatures. I am sending my communication on Thursday this week, as the Board has designated tomorrow's scheduled Professional Development Day as a Staff Wellness Day and schools will be closed. Both the Board of Trustees and I are deeply appreciative of the hard work and dedication of our staff in service of our students and their families. Whether it has been additional planning, the provision of instruction and support both in-person and online, or constant assistance with things like sanitization and monitoring adherence to health protocols, our staff are the reason that the Division has been able to continue providing quality Catholic education to our students while keeping our school communities healthy and safe throughout this pandemic.

This week we have been praying with an ecumenical spirit as we mark the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. In John's Gospel, Jesus prays for his disciples before going to the cross. He urges that his followers "may all be one," as he and the Father are one, "so that the world may believe" and have life in His holy name (John 17). In this passage, it is underscored that the concept of unity amongst Christians is central to the very being of the Church, as well as to its mission and witness. Please continue to pray for the growth of an ecumenical spirit in the hearts of our Christian Churches.

I am pleased to announce that the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 Division Calendars have been finalized and temporary versions have been posted to the [Division Calendar](#) page of our website. I would like to thank our stakeholders for providing their guidance and feedback during the calendar development process. Families and staff were engaged via an online survey and further opportunities for feedback and input were provided through conversations with School Councils, the Division's Policy Advisory Committee, as well as School Leadership Teams. I truly feel that we captured the voice of our community and am particularly excited about the staggered entry days for students at the beginning of the year. This was well-received by both families and staff this year and was identified as something to explore moving forward, even once we are past this time of pandemic. The staggered entry days provide a unique opportunity for teachers and school staff to orientate and connect with students more personally on the first two days of the school year.

On January 27, 2021, Dr. Deena Hinshaw, Chief Medical Officer of Health, indicated that the current health measures are necessarily in effect because "despite the decreasing number of people ending up in hospital with COVID-19, Alberta's medical system remains under duress." We continue to be vigilant in adhering to health measures for schools.
