We are St. Albert's only single-track French Immersion Junior/Senior High School. Dedicated to our school's namesake motto of Dignity, Respect and Service our approach to teaching and learning is Christ-centered where we provide a safe and caring environment in which to learn and grow.

We offer a fully Bilingual program from grades seven to twelve and our results speak for themselves. The graduates from ESSMY are well prepared to enter into post-secondary education or into the workforce.

Our graduates have the opportunity to complete an International French Proficiency Exam giving them International Bilingual Certification. This certification entails the students performing both a written as well as oral French competency exam; from there, with the results they receive a corresponding level of certification which is recognized internationally by both employers as well as post-secondary institutions.

On the following pages we have listed the courses that are available to students. Our commitment is to offer quality classroom instruction in courses as we have offered in the past.

We also offer on-line courses through our iLearn Centre and through ADLC (Alberta Distance Learning Center). The iLearn Centre is staffed by a teacher and an educational assistant. The iLearn Centre's offerings are designed to complement ESSMY and assist with small enrolment classes. Students are required to take in-class courses if they are offered at a suitable time on a student's ESSMY timetable.

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ACADEMIC PREP PROGRAMMING

ADVANCED PLACEMENT

Advanced Placement (AP) is an internationally-recognized enrichment program that offers acceleration and challenge to motivated and gifted students as it prepares them for the transition from high school to university. AP is designed to give students the experience of as intro-level college class while still in high school. As well as credit for college/university is given upon course completion. AP Examinations, which students take in May, are graded on a 5-point scale (5 is the highest). Some of the nation's colleges and universities award credit, advanced placement, or both for grades of 3 or higher. The AP Examinations consist of multiple-choice and free-response (essay or problem-solving) questions.

What are the benefits of AP?

- allows students to study one or more subjects at an advanced level, depending upon the individual student's interests and expertise
- provides enrichment and challenge for academically talented and well-motivated students
- helps students develop and practice higher order thinking skills
- assists with transition from high school to post-secondary studies
- helps students prepare for scholarship examinations and AP College Board examinations
- provides students with an opportunity to earn university credits, standing and/or placement while in high school.

Who should take AP courses?

Generally, a grade of 75-80% in a prerequisite course is suggested for students who wish to take an AP course. More important is the student's motivation and commitment to the importance of education and:

- enjoy a challenge
- have a well-developed work ethic
- be self-disciplined and self-motivated
- be motivated to achieve
- find learning stimulating and exciting
- have parental support and approval.







ROTARY INTERACT CLUB

Involvement with the Rotary

Leadership is an essential aspect of Rotary and here at ESSMY, we offer our students the opportunity to help our students become emerging leaders and develop their skills. Through these groups, participants strengthen their leadership skills, serve their communities, increase their world understanding, build friendships, and more.

Interact Club


HOSPITALITY AND TOURISM MANAGEMENT

Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools has partnered with Norquest College to deliver a post-secondary Hospitality and Tourism Management course. We are currently in the only school in Canada offering this program. The Hospitality and Tourism Management program incorporates the theory and knowledge you gain from a traditional degree program in business administration and tourism studies, along with experiential learning in tourism industry sectors. Throughout the course, you will engage in analyzing a series of business and management scenarios for which you will prepare recommendations and solutions. It also provides an international perspective through case studies that reflect the global nature of the tourism industry.

The Hospitality and Tourism Management program:

- provides a management certificate
- aids in preparation for international work and travel
- sharpens communication skills
- initiates entrepreneurial ideas
- explores interests, passions and strengths

This course is a dual-credit course, meaning that students will get credits towards their post-secondary education.





DUAL CREDIT PROGRAMMING

Business 201

Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools has partnered with MacEwan University to deliver university-level business courses to qualified students at our three senior high schools. Students partaking in the GSACRD International School of Business program will earn both high school and university credits at the same time, allowing them to finish high school and get a head start on university. Students who have completed English 30-1 and Math 30-1 or 30-2 will have the opportunity to take the following courses:

BUSN 201 - Introduction to Canadian Business (3 credits)

This is an interdisciplinary course based on the premise that managerial decision-making requires an understanding of business as well as related fields in the humanities and the social sciences. The course covers three major themes: innovation and entrepreneurship, complex interactions/complex organizations and the national/international business environment.




Students will build a foundation for third and fourth languages as well as gaining insight into other cultures and traditions.

ACADEMIC COURSES ENGLISH



Recommend 10-1, 20-1, 30-1 stream if 60% or above in Language Arts 9 Recommend 10-2, 20-2, 30-2 stream if 60% or below in Language Arts 9





English Language Arts 10-1, 20-1, 30-1

This sequence is designed for students whose post-secondary plans include university study and\or a career that involves the development, production, teaching and\or study of more complex texts. It provides students with an increased emphasis on textual analysis.

English Language Arts 30 - 2 (This course is ntegrated in 30-1 if in the best interest of the student or future career plans)

This sequence provides for students who need more assistance in developing reading and text study skills than a student in the ELA 10-1, 20-1, 30-1 stream. This features the study of text at a variety of different levels of sophistication for students more diverse in their aspirations.

All course sequences:

- require that students write a diploma level course upon completion of the 30-1 or 30- 2 level courses
- maintain high standards to meet graduation requirements
- Feature the six language arts: listening, speaking, reading, writing, viewing and representing
- emphasize correct and effective communication in a variety of formats



French Language Arts


French Language Arts 10 - 20 - 30

French Language Arts 10-1, 20-1, 30-1, has been developed to meet the specific linguistic needs of senior high students. This course has a double focus: the development of a functional use of the French language in personal, social and academic settings; as well as the development and enhancement of one's identity and pride. As in any language program, language skill development - listening/viewing, speaking, reading and writing— at every grade level to enhance progressively the students' ability to communicate effectively in the French language.

The study of grammar and vocabulary acquisition are pursued to ensure clear and appropriate communication. A great deal of emphasis is placed on the planning, monitoring and evaluation strategies that students need to use to complete successfully communication projects.

The study of French literature—novels, plays, poetry, short stories - allows the students to gain understanding, pride and appreciation for their culture and traditions. It is expected that all students in grade 12 will register for and successfully complete French Language Arts 30-1.

SOCIAL STUDIES



Recommend 10-1, 20-1, 30-1 stream if 60% or above in Social 9 and subsequent classes Recommend 10-2, -20-2, 30-2 stream if 60% or below in Social 9 and subsequent classes



Social Studies is a school subject that assists students in acquiring basic knowledge, skills and positive attitudes needed to be responsible citizens and contributing members of society. The content of social studies draws upon history, geography, economics, and other social sciences, the behavioral sciences and humanities. The content also serves as the context in which important skills and attitudes are developed.

Social Studies

10-1 Perspectives on Globalization

Grade 10 explores multiple perspectives on the origins of globalization and the local, national and international impacts of globalization on identity, lands, cultures, economies, human rights and quality of life.

Social Studies


20-1 Perspectives in Nationalism

Grade 11 explores the complexities of nationalism in Canadian and international contexts and includes study of the origins of nationalism and the influence of nationalism on regional, international and global relations.

Social Studies

30-1/AP Perspectives on Ideology 30-2 (Integrated into 30-1 if in the best interest of the student) 30-1/AP - European History

Grade 12 explores the origins and complexities of ideologies. Students will investigate, analyze and evaluate government policies and actions and develop individual and collective responses to contemporary local, national and global issues.



Course 1 Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical- thinking skills identified for entry into post-secondary programs that require the study of calculus.

Topics include algebra and number; measurement; relations and functions; trigonometry; and permutations, combinations and binomial theorem.

Course 2 Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical-thinking skills identified for post-secondary studies in programs that do not require the study of calculus. Topics include geometry, measurement, number and logic, logical reasoning, relations and functions, tatistics, and probability.


Course 3 Sequence

This course sequence is designed to provide students with the mathematical understandings and critical-Thinking skills identified for entry into the majority of trades and for direct entry into the work force. Topics include algebra, geometry, measurement, number, statistics and probability.

Mathematics 31

This course is for students who will be considering any mathematics, science and business courses at the post-secondary level. The main topics covered are limits, derivatives, maximum and minimum value problems, rate problems integration, and drawing curves.



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SCIENCE 10

Students will be expected to develop an understanding of:

- The key concepts and principles of science that transcend the discipline boundaries.
- The processes by which scientific knowledge is developed.
- The interdependent relationships of science, technology and society.

Science 10 emphasizes the key concepts of energy, matter and change. The conceptual themes provide a means of showing the connections among the scientific disciplines. Science 10 consists of four units of study.

Unit 1 – Energy and Matter in Chemical Change Unit 2 – Energy Flow in Technological Systems

Unit 3 – Cycling of Matter in Living Systems

Unit 4 – Energy Flow in Global Systems

BIOLOGY 20

This course consists of four units of study:

- Energy and Matter Exchange in the Biosphere
- Ecosystems and Population Change
- Photosynthesis and Cellular Respiration
- Human Systems

BIOLOGY 30

This course consists of four units of study:

- Nervous and Endocrine Systems
- Reproduction and Development
- Cells Division, Genetics and Molecular Biology
- Population and Community Dynamics

CHEMISTRY 20

This course consists of four units of study:

- The Diversity of Matter and Chemical Bonding
- Forms of Matter: Gases
- Matter as Solutions, Acids and Bases
- Quantitative Relationships in Chemical Changes

CHEMISTRY 30

This course consists of three units of study:

- Thermochemical Changes
- Electrochemical Changes
- Chemical Changes of Organic Compounds
- Chemical Equilibrium Focusing on Acid-Base Systems

PHYSICS 20

This course consists of four units of study:

- Kinematics
- Dynamics
- Circular Motion, Work and Energy
- Oscillatory Motion and Mechanical Waves

PHYSICS 30

This course consists of four units of study:

- Momentum and Impulse
- Forces and Fields
- Electromagnetic Radiation
- Atomic Physics

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PHYS ED

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 10 - \$150.00 (approximately)

The physical education program features a student-centered learning environment where each student will have the opportunity to improve their skill level and knowledge in a variety of activities. This program is intended to foster the formulation of a healthy lifestyle while promoting social skills and values transferable to other areas of the students' lives. Students are provided with experiences, which encourage lifelong activity regardless of ability level. These objectives are achieved through participation and instruction in such activities as:

PHYSICAL EDUCATION 20 + 30 - \$150.00 (approximately) fee for each course

These courses offer the student experiences not available at previous levels. Instruction may cover aspects of sports medicine, first aid and anatomy in addition to further exploration of various activities. The student expectation is high as some activities take students beyond the immediate community and require a high level of maturity and personal organization. Students may also experience some aspects of the administration or teaching of sports or extra-curricular activities. Possible activities may include:

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RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The Ste. Marguerite d'Youville community lives its Catholic faith in all that it does.

Faith is evident in our prayer life, instruction and interactions among staff, students and parents.

Catholic schools have a goal to educate the whole person. Our school community's foundation is the Gospel message of love and service. It is the goal of the Catholic school to "relate all of the human culture to the good news of salvation so that the light of faith will illuminate everything that the students learn about the world, about life, and about the human person." By example, the staff express Catholic values in every aspect of instruction, and emphasize the values of love, justice, compassion, understanding, tolerance, service, stewardship, and respect for life.

To be disciples of Jesus is the first vocation of all Christians. All members of our school community-students, parents, and staff - are on a journey of spiritual growth. We are obligated to help each other along this path by cooperating and sharing our God-given gifts and talents. We, the staff are committed to promoting Catholic values and guiding students into becoming the person that God has called them to become.

Religious education is an essential and integral part of the life and culture of a Catholic school. We invite students to develop the knowledge, beliefs, skills, values and attitudes needed to build a relationship with God and community through the person of Jesus Christ. Religious education shares the same goals and objectives of all good education - the growth and development of the complete person in every dimension—physical, intellectual, emotional, social and spiritual.

Prayer is an integral part of the Religious Education Program and of each school day since intimacy with God is the ultimate goal of Catechesis. By respecting the individual differences of children and our changing human needs, prayer is experienced in many different ways: silent reflection, guided imagery, scriptural prayer, song and formal community prayer. As we enter into prayer, we give praise and thanks for God's loving presence and call upon the Spirit to guide, nourish and empower our lives through Jesus Christ.



Religious Studies 15: Christ and Culture

Jesus Christ: God's Gift of Salvation invites students to deepen their relationship with Jesus through a prayerful study of Scripture. Students will explore the Jewish historical, religious, and cultural world into which the Messiah was born and the Old Testament covenant fulfilled. Using the Gospels as primary sources, the course explores Jesus' birth, early life, and ministry; his preaching of the Kingdom of God; his special teachings, particularly the parables; and his miracles. It then focuses on the scriptural accounts of his death and Resurrection, and the Ascension, and their central significance for the church's understanding of Jesus as the Christ, the Son of God.

Religious Studies 25: Jesus Christ - God's Gift of Salvation

World Religions 30: A Comparative Study

World Religions: A Canadian Catholic Perspective studies each religious tradition both as an independent belief system and as a religion in dialogue with Catholicism.

Religious Studies 35 - In Search of the Good

In Search of the Good challenges students to understand themselves as moral persons called to discipleship by living he way of Christ. Through an examination of ethical theories, the revelation of Sacred Scripture, and the lived experience and teaching of the Catholic Church, the course invites students to mature as active participants in their faith. At the heart of catechesis is the human search for happiness as the completion of the superabundant love of God. The same tension which exists between the revelation of God's love and the explorations of human reason are worked out in the areas of freedom, justice, human relations, ecology, reconciliation, life in community and political life.

CAREER AND TECHNOLOGY STUDIES

Career and Technology Studies (CTS) provides students with practical, hands-on learning experiences in the area of personal interest, applied technology and general career exploration. In CTS, students use and apply technology effectively and efficiently to solve problems, and/or produce usable products within a personal working environment.

Students in CTS are expected to:

- · develop skills that can be applied in their daily lives now and in the future
- refine career planning skills
- develop technology-related skills
- enhance employability skills
- apply and reinforce learning developed in other subject areas
- prepare for transition to adult roles in the community, workplace and/or further education.

Integrated throughout CTS are employability skills, those basic competencies that help students develop personal management and social skills. Employability skills allow students to transfer knowledge and technical skills to the workplace. Personal management skills improve as students increase responsibility for their learning, design innovative solutions to problems and challenges, and efficiently manage resources, including time. Social skills improve through learning experiences that require students to work with others, demonstrate teamwork and leadership, and maintain high standards in safety and accountability. There are many, many modules in CTS that students can study; topics of interest are to be discussed with the teacher and most interests can be accommodated.

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CONSTRUCTION TECHNOLOGY

Basic Tools and Materials

Prerequisite: none

Students develop basic hand tool and production skills to transform common building materials into useful products.

Solid Stock Construction

Prerequisite: Basic Tools and Materials

Students develop basic hand and power tool skills to build a product made from solid wood.

Manufactured Materials

Prerequisite: Basic Tools and Materials

Students select and use the appropriate materials and tools to build a product or structure from a wood composite or other manufactured material.

Students may choose from any of the other Construction and Fabrication modules available on the Alberta Learning website. Specific arrangements may be made with the teacher.

Examples:

- Turning operations Wood Lathe
- The design process Drafting
- CAD fundamentals Computer Assisted Drafting
- Furniture making





WELDING

The following First Period Apprenticeship levels are available for the following courses, as the students acquire the necessary prerequisites:

Fabrication Orientation and Safety

Prerequisite: none

Students develop an understanding of basic work site safety practices

Fabrication Tools and Weld Faults

Prerequisite: none

Students develop knowledge and skills in the use of basic hand and power tools used in fabrication processes. They identify the causes of faults in welds and methods for their prevention.

Gas Metal Arc Welding

Prerequisite: none

Students develop basic knowledge and skills related to the use of Gas Metal Arc Welding (GMAW).

TOURISM STUDIES

Tourism Studies 10 (3 credits) This course is made up of 3 separate courses:

Prerequisite: none

Tourism Industry

- Students will analyze the organizational structure of the tourism industry at local and provincial levels.
- Students will investigate employment opportunities in tourism.

Travel Sector

- · Students research a variety of travel services, demonstrate basic travel information and promotion skills.
- Students will investigate career opportunities in providing travel information.

Tourism Destinations 1

• Students must demonstrate knowledge of world tourism geography by presenting travel information about North America and at least one other world region.

Tourism Studies 20 (3 credits) This course is made up of 3 separate courses:

Prerequisite: Tourism Studies 10

Attraction Sector

- Students analyze and compare the natural, cultural and recreational attractions available in Alberta.
- Students will develop strategies to maintain the well being of guests.
- Students will investigate employment opportunities in the attractions sector.

Hotel/Motel Operations

- Students demonstrate correct check-in and checkout procedures.
- Students will research the organization of a large hotel.
- Students will analyze hotel marketing strategies.
- Students will present a marketing plan for a hotel department.

Tourism Destinations 30

• Students demonstrate knowledge of world tourism geography by presenting travel information about four major tourism regions of the world.

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Creative Yarns and Textiles

Prerequisite: none

Learn about various yarn or textiles arts and crafts and the skills involved. Choose one yarn or textile art to learn more about such as knitting, crochet, embroidery, cross stitch, weaving or string art and apply your research to creating on a project.

Creating Home Décor

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Apply design and sewing techniques to create a home decor fashion. Possible projects include a quilt or quillow, pillow shams, a window covering, or furniture throw. This is your chance to show your personal style through home decor.

Activewear

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Apply design and sewing techniques as you create an activewear garment. Use your new found knowledge to create a clothing item such as a jogging pants, hoodie or a T-shirt.

Specialty Fabric

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Discover the world of Specialty Fabric! An in-depth study of various sewing technique and fabrics will be incorporated into a garment of your choice.

FASHION STUDIES

Ready Set Sew!

Prerequisite: none

Discover the creative world of sewing! Learn how to safely use and care for sewing and pressing equipment, and apply these skills in project assembly. Choose your own simple project to complete such as boxer shorts, pajamas or an accessory to decorate your room.

Fashion Basics

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Make clothing that is as unique as you are. Learn how to determine pattern size, choose a suitable patternand fabric, make pattern alterations, and prepare the fabric and pattern for layout. Building on what you have learned in Ready Set Sew, use your skills to make a garment such as shorts, pants, a skirt or a bathrobe.

Repair and Recycle

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Create something new from something old. Learn to restore or recycle garments by repairing, customizing, redesigning, or embellishing the garment. Use these techniques to update your wardrobe or turn discarded items into new treasures. Save money and resources by repairing and recycling what you already have.

Creating Accessories 1

Prerequisite: Ready Set Sew!

Details are important - in your wardrobe and in decorating your home. Use basic sewing skills learned in Ready Set Sew to construct a home or personal accessory. Create something new for your room like cushions, picture frames, or a closet organizer. Or make a useful personal accessory like a backpack, sports bag, or hat and mittens.

COSMETOLOGY

Cosmetology 10

Courses at this introductory level introduce students to some fundamental topic areas of the beauty industry. Students will learn skills involving how to apply make-up, perform manicures, and create long hair looks using braids, twists and knots. In addition, they will learn how to shampoo, blow-dry and style hair just like the professionals do in the salon. Courses are delivered in a modular format with each course being equivalent to 1 credit.

Cosmetology 20

Cosmetology 20 is built on fundamental practices learned in Cosmetology 10. Whether a general interest or a career aspiration, courses at this intermediate level will provide insight into the knowledge, skills and attitudes important in the salon industry.

Esthetics 10

Personal & Professional Practices

Students identify the basic structures and functions of the skin. Students analyze skin and perform basic skin care practices, including cleansing, toning, nourishing and protecting.

Esthetics 20

Skin Care Practices

Students analyze facial shapes and features and perform make-up techniques.





Fast and Convenience Foods

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Consider budget, time and quality of food while learning to make wise choices in buying and using fast foods and convenience foods. Create your own versions of favorite fast foods at home such as oven fries, chicken fingers, and pizza. Make your own affordable, nutritious convenience foods, too, such as cake mix and pudding mix.

Fish and Poultry

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Learn the important role that fish and poultry play in your diet, their nutritional value and various cooking methods. Try out a variety of mouth-watering recipes that will impress your family.

Canadian Heritage Foods

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Does your family have special recipes that are part of your traditions? Become aware of how food in Canada today reflects the country's history and origins. Examine food patterns and customs and analyze and prepare a variety of ethnic foods.

Milk Products and Eggs

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Develop skills with milk products and eggs and compare the various products available, what they contribute to cooked foods, and how they are best used. These humble ingredients are the basis for many classic dishes such as soufflé, omelets, puddings, quiche, hollandaise sauce and even cheesecake. Try your hand at making some of these spectacular sweet and savory dishes.

Creative Cold Foods

Prerequisite: Food Basics

There is more to life than peanut butter and jam! Learn to combine nutrition and creativity in the preparation of scrumptious salads and sandwiches. Practice your skills with cold foods and become a salad and sandwich gourmet.

FOOD STUDIES

Food Basics

Prerequisite: none

Learn to make wise food choices and to understand recipes, equipment, care in handling food, and the importance of safe and efficient work habits. Create tasty food products based on Canada's Food Guide during hands-on labs and in your own kitchen.

Baking Basics

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Never buy a birthday cake again! Develop an understanding of basic baking ingredients by combining them in a variety of ways to make wonderful cookies, cakes, muffins and biscuits.

Vegetables, Fruits, and Grains

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Learn about the wide range of vegetable, fruit, and grain choices available and how to retain their nutritional value and quality through a variety of cooking methods. Learn the basics and beyond about cooking these three important foods and using them to spice up your everyday meals.

Snacks and Appetizers

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Snacking is an important part of a good diet. Learn to make informed snack choices that are both nutritious and delicious. Try out a variety of recipes for wholesome and mouth-watering snacks.

Meal Planning 1

Prerequisite: Food Basics

Begin to develop an understanding of eating and meal requirements through creative planning, preparing, and serving of food. Learn what is needed to plan a successful special occasion or one-pot family meal.

CALM 20 (3 credits)

This course is a graduation requirement in Alberta. It challenges students to look closely at their personal values and ideals as they prepare to enter the world of work and live on their own. The course gives students the opportunity to work through a number of possible situations ranging from personal relationship to work-related issues. The emphasis in this course is on the importance of establishing goals and achieving the goals that meet the personal values of each student.

LEADERSHIP (minimum 3 -1 credit modules)

This course is available to all students who are interested in learning about leadership and developing their leadership skills. The Leadership Course Curriculum uses leadership modules from the Career Transitions strand of CTS (shown below). Students take one of the Lead Modules and pair with a maximum of 4 extension modules. The curriculum component of the course is presented through group sessions, independent assigned studies/research, movie studies, seminars, and leadership retreats. Students learn form leaders in the school and in the community. Practical experience (up to 100 hrs per year) is earned through in-school leadership activities (clubs, events, grad, student council, etc) or in community leadership activities (coaching, volunteering). These activities offer the student opportunities to develop and practice leadership skills. Students are required to maintain a journal; this allows for the tracking of course material and student reflections. Students are required to meet with a lead teacher at mutually agreed upon scheduled times (lunch-time, after school etc.) Some of the Leadership modules include:

WORK EXPERIENCE

If you want to continue working on your high school diploma and gain some experience in the world of work, or build a résumé, this could be for you!

Work Experience 15, 25 and 35

The Work Experience program presents a learning opportunity in school and on the job. Work Experience students develop personal growth, acquire employability skills and explore prospective careers. The school recommends that prospective Work Experience students check with the school counselor before the beginning of the term to schedule their program and discuss placement.

Work Experience 15

This course begins with a mandatory 25-hour pre-employment introduction module, which concentrates on career testing, resume writing, and job-search skills. This module is worth one credit. Once completed, students are to arrange interviews with employers in areas related to their career goals. It is suggested that students are not placed with past employers or relatives.

A student may contract to work at different work placements. Students registering for the work modules must complete and sign the Work Experience Contract.



Work Experience 25

This course begins with a mandatory 25-hour pre-employment introduction module, which concentrates on job safety. This module is worth one credit. Once completed, students are to arrange interviews with employers in areas related to their career goals. It is suggested that students are not placed with past employers or relatives.

A student may contract to work at different work placements. Students registering for the work modules must complete and sign the Work Experience Contract.

Work Experience 35

This course begins with a mandatory 25-hour pre-employment introduction module, which concentrates on career planning. This module is worth one credit. Once completed, students are to arrange interviews with employers in areas related to their career goals. It is suggested that students are not placed with past employers or relatives.

A student may contract to work at different work placements. Students registering for the work modules must complete and sign the Work Experience Contract.



FINE ARTS

ART

The courses offer a great opportunity for students to develop their creative and performing talents. In addition to the regular class work, fine arts students have the opportunity to write and perform dramatic works for in- school and community performances. Music students may join any one of four bands and choir for school and community concerts. Art students participate in art competitions and exhibits beyond the basic course work.

ART 10

Art 10 is a course designed to give students a broad exposure to the media of art. Areas to be covered are drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking, and design. Students will be introduced to the creative process through the study of visual communication and the elements and principles of design. Students will learn new techniques as well as develop and refine their drawing skills and styles.

ART 20

Art 20 is a three credit course, which aims at further development of creative and technical skills. The main units are drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture, environment and architecture, graphic and industrial design, and art history. Students will explore personal selection of expressions and engage in art criticism to interpret and evaluate both their works and the works of others.

ART 30

Art 30 is a five credit course and is year-long. It continues further development technical skills through study, experimentation, research, and analysis. This course is a process of personal expression and growth focusing primarily on modern art. The students become more responsible for selecting appropriate media for their projects and a more independent and thorough understanding of art ideas is developed. At this level, students will achieve their own style through in-depth studies.

MUSIC

These courses will be offered at lunch time, after school or before the regular school day begins.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC 10/20/30

Instrumental Music 10 explores the basic fundamentals of music structure, composition and style.

Course content includes study of his/her own instrument, ear training, theoretical studies, conducting and ensemble playing. Students should have 2 years experience playing a concert band instrument.

MUSICAL THEATRE 12/25/35

The Musical Theatre Program is intended for students interested in all apsects of music and theatre production.

CHORAL MUSIC 10/20/30

The choral music program seeks to develop musical competency and strives for excellence within the limits of the student's capabilities. The concepts of rhythm, melody, harmony, form and expression provide the intellectual framework of the music program. Concepts are essentially taught through student participation in the skill areas of singing, playing, listening, reading (and writing) and creating.





Athletics

We are now a member of Metro Athletics. Students will now have the opportunity to play on teams of their choice at District High Schools.

ESSMY offers senior boys' and girls' athletic teams in volleyball, basketball,badminton, cross country running, and track and field. Teams are based on student interest and participation and, they focus on a competitive experience.

Intramural Athletics

Students are encouraged to join the lunch time intramural program as a way to meet other students and to develop a healthy and active lifestyle. Our high school students, under the direction of our physical education lead teacher, are invited to organize and lead the activities.



STUDENT SERVICES

Counseling Services

The counseling services available to all students aim to help individual students to get to know themselves better, to adapt to their social milieu and to prepare them for a successful present and future. The counseling department also works to help students succeed academically.

All students have access to information about universities, colleges and trade schools in Alberta as well as other parts of Canada. Students are also encouraged to log on to www.scholarshipcanada.com to access all scholarships in Canada.

Students are invited and encouraged to speak to our counselor and/or administration about their career goals and plans for post-secondary studies. This will help students choose appropriate courses in order that acceptance to post-secondary becomes smoother.

Counseling support is also available for students experiencing other difficulties in their lives and/or with their learning. As well, contact with outside agencies can be facilitated through our counselor.

Cafeteria

The cafeteria is open for lunch on Wednesdays through Fridays. A varied menu of hot food is served regularly. There are also snack foods available.

Learning Commons/Library

Our learning commons is "an inclusive, flexible, learner-centered, physical or virtual space for collaboration, inquiry, imagination and play." The area helps promote collaboration and engagement of learning with the added use of technology. "The environment helps prepare students to become critical thinkers, evaluators, users and creators of information and knowledge." - Alberta Education

Printed materials are available in both French and English. We have laptops and chromebooks for student use, and the after-school and lunch time Study Hall is housed in the learning commons.

SCHOLARSHIPS

RUTHERFORD SCHOLARSHIP

Alexander Rutherford High School Achievement Scholarship was named in honour of Alexander Rutherford, who had the distinction of being Alberta's first Premier. He was known for his strong support of public education, particularly the University of Alberta, and his active involvement in community affairs.

Purpose

To recognize and reward academic achievement at the senior high school level and to encourage students to pursue post-secondary studies.

Value - Up to \$2,500

Eligibility

Apply once you have been accepted in full-time post-secondary studies. All high school courses must be completed before starting post-secondary studies. Applicants must also have completed high school on or after September 30, 1980.

To receive this scholarship, you must also meet all of these eligibility criteria:


- be a Canadian Citizen, a permanent resident of Canada or have protected person status under
- Canada's Immigration and Refugee Protection Act
 Note: Visa students are not eligible for this scholarship.
- be an Alberta resident at the time of application; you or your parent(s)/legal guardian must have resided in Alberta at least 12 consecutive months prior to starting post-secondary studies
- Must have resided in Alberta throughout the whole of the qualifying grade(s); you or your parent(s)/legal guardian were resident in Alberta throughout the whole of the qualifying grade(s)
- be enrolled in, or have completed 60% of a full course load in a post-secondary or an apprenticeship program of at least one semester in length

Please note - you may only be awarded the Alexander Rutherford scholarship once.

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POST SECONDARY

Choosing high school courses

It is important to keep in mind post-secondary admission requirements when choosing high school courses. For example, university programs may require either Mathematics 30-1, Math 30-2 or French Language Arts 30-1. It is the student's responsibility to ensure that admission requirements are met. Support and information regarding your post-secondary plans is available.

Your average is important

Acceptance to post-secondary programs at all institutions is becoming increasingly more competitive. Institution calendars indicate minimum application averages. These are the minimum averages a person could possibly have in order to be accepted into a program. In fact, however, actual averages needed for acceptance may be significantly higher than minimum. Averages are determined each year based on the number of students applying and their marks. Verifying this information with the institutions in which you are applying is critical.

Making Choices


There are several events held each year to assist students in their decisionmaking regarding post secondary education:


- In November, St. Albert high schools hold a "Post Secondary Information Fair."

REGISTRATION

- All students registering at ESSMY for the first time must report to the school administration and present their academic achievement records from their previous school(s). Students from out of province/country must provide necessary documents before placement can be finalized.
- Students should discuss their program and course selections with their parents, their counselor, and/or their school administrators.
- Payment is available on line or by cheque, payable to ESSMY.
- · Student timetables will be available on your PowerSchool account in late August.
- School opening procedures and times will be advertised in the local newspapers in August, and the information will also be available on our website: www.essmy.gsacrd.ab.ca as well as on the school district website www.gsacrd.ab.ca.
- To register using the school website, download and print off the registration form, complete it and mail it to the school. Also, on the website, is an icon to set up for online fee payments. Once your account is set up, you will receive an email to let you know that fees are due.




